All fantastic courses. I would highly recommend encouraging students to take intensive classes (J Term) as well as extensive classes (normal term). I also highly recommend the Spanish language and culture classes.

How did the academic experience/workload/style of teaching differ from Otago?

I found the level a lot easier than at Otago, and the workload was very manageable. However, it is impossible to change classes, so be careful during the selection process. I had to drop two classes and received zeros for them because I signed up for too many courses, thinking it was better to have more options in case I made a mistake in the selection process. It's quite common not to have an exam (which is nice).

#### Accommodation

What accommodation did you stay in? What were the pros and cons of your accommodation? I stayed with a company called Live Further in Eixample. Great flat, great roommates, great location. A very reliable company—I would recommend it to everyone.

#### Money matters

My rent was 695 Euros a month. My flights were roughly 2400 Euros return. It's important to buy Spanish health insurance, as the one recommended by Otago is not accepted by the Spanish Embassy. I used a company called Sanitas.

I used a money app called Wise. This helped me avoid fees. In Spain it is important to carry cash as sometimes cards are not accepted.

#### Visas & Insurance

Did you have to apply for a visa? What was the process?

The visa process was VERY challenging. I had to fly to Wellington for a meeting at the Spanish Embassy. I then had to surrender my passport and it was sent back to me by courier.

Did your host university have a mandatory insurance?

Not my host university but the Spanish government requires a Spanish health insurance agency. I used Sanitas.

What organised activities were available to students? What extra-curricular activities would you recommend to future exchange students?

There were a lot of ice breaker events that I recommend all future students get involved in.

What was the university/city like?

The university itself was very social. There were lots of introductory exchange events and social gatherings organized. Unfortunately, there is not a lot of crossover between exchange students and regular semester students, which was a shame.

You will probably go over budget. I did not anticipate the amount of traveling the exchange students at ESADE do. They tend to leave Barcelona every second weekend to explore other countries due to how cheap flights are around Europe. So, be prepared to spend more than you are anticipating.

The night and social life in Barcelona is incredible, and it definitely starts and ends a lot later than we are used to in NZ, so be ready for that.
