How did the academic experience/workload/style of teaching differ from Otago?

The workload was a bit more than Otago in that you had many smaller assignments to keep on top off but it wasn't too much different. The assignments were sort of similar although I did a lot more presentations than Otago and less group work. I did not have to write large reports or essays just

smaller ones. The teaching was overall similar in terms of lectures although two of my courses were two 1.5 hr lectures a week and the professors were easy to access for extra help. I had no labs or fieldtrips which I was a bit disappointed with, although this may have been because I went in winter/the courses I chose. The classes were mostly seminar style.

#### Cons:

I think the residence application process was poorly handled. They were not very fast at letting us know about accommodation. You put preferences down, but these are not really taken into consideration as myself and other exchange students did not get any of our preferences. I also was assigned a shared room; I emailed to try and get a single room but was urged to take there offer as Halifax supposedly has a housing crisis. Which is kind of true but also many people flat and lots of exchange students did not have a hard time finding a house. I then ended up not having a roommate.

Other exchange students experience with a roommate sounds negative and uncomfortable and were put with a roommate when they asked to not have one and when asking to switch rooms as they were not able to sleep were turned away.
